### The Pro-Ject Debut Recordmaster By Jeff Dorgay

Music continues to branch out, taking its own path, yet for all the available streaming services, you still cant get *everything* you want in a digital stream.

Even if you're slightly more dinosaric in your digital music listening, with a gaggle of files on a NAS drive, some of your favorite vinyl treasures are still out of your reach. You never know when that urge to hear The Bliss Band is going to strike, and your hands just might be unavailable. I'll leave the thoughts of TMI to you.

In my day, we used to archive our favorite tunes to tape. Those of you checking my age bracket box remember, you'd get that new album home, and not wanting to wear it out, a fresh Maxell XLII or TDK SA was unwrapped and a pristine copy was made. Yep, just as todays youngsters argue about file formats, we argued about tape formulations. It never goes away, does it?

Pro-Ject has come up with something really cool for those of you facing this dilemma in the year 2018.

Their new Debut Recordmaster combines friendly elements we already know; the Debut turntable, and an Ortofon 2M Red along with an analog to digital converter (ADC) that is capable of rendering your tunes to digital files in up to 24/192 or DSD. Thanks to the built in phono stage, you can connect it to any analog source that has a high level input, or you can even plug into a sound bar, via the digital outputs. (USB and S/PDIF) As usual, Windows users will have to do a bit of shuffling with drivers, but once that's out of the way, you're rocking your favorite records.

Pretty cool, eh?

Great sound for less than a G!

Now, the only real choice is what color? The color choices aren't quite as wide as the standard Debut, but the four at your disposal should fit in nearly any decor scheme with ease. As Sammy Hagar elequently said, "green aint me compared to red." At least arguing about what color to make the turntable is way more fun than arguing about politics. Am I right?

Much has been written about the Debut, so to give you a quick once over, it's a great basic deck, and thanks to the Ortofon 2M red, the sound is very neutral. Those feeling the urge to upgrade, can easily substitute one of the 2M cartridges further up the range, though you will need some kind of alignment protractor to get a perfect fit. Tracking force will not change. And yes, we did have to try it - the 2M Bronze shown elsewere in this issue does make for a good sonic upgrade, though it nearly doubles the price of the table.

Kudos to Pro-Ject for offering the ability to produce high resolution files, but for most of us, selecting the 16/44 option is going to be just fine. Digitizing a handful of files at CD quality resolution proved excellent for casual use in my music server and perfect on my mobile devices. Those wanting archival results will want to move upstream, but for the target audience, the Debut Recordmaster is a perfect fit. It will play records effortlessly, and make on the go files, when you want to take your records with you.

And you can still use those analog outputs to make a mix tape.

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## The Journeyman Audiophile


Arriving on the scene a couple of years after its big brother the JC3+, the goal of the John Curl, Carl Thompson and Parasound was to bring the strengths of the JC3+, great sound and incredible flexibility for use with most any cartridge, to a more affordable price point. Initially, expectations were to deliver the unit at a \$2000 price point vs the \$2995 of its big brother. However, upon completion Parasound determined they could deliver at an amazing \$1,495! Half price with nearly 80% of the performance. I was certainly intrigued hearing about the unit and arranged a review piece asap.


Once the JC3jr arrived I was pleased to see it had the same great aesthetic in the style that the other Parasound components had but in a much lower profile 1U chassis than the JC3+. My review unit was silver and can also be purchased in black. The front only has a power button and a Mono/ Stereo switch with the position designated by Blue (Stereo) or Amber (Mono) lighting. On the back are Single Ended L/R inputs and a choice of Single Ended or Balanced (3 pin XLR) outputs. Going back to the definition of Value the JC3jr offers up variable or fixed impedance choices, variable Moving Coil impedance options from 50 Ohms to 550 Ohms and three gain select options of 40, 50 and 60 dB in Single ended at 46, 56 and 66 dB in Balanced. I am not aware of any under \$2000 Phono Pre's that offer as wide a range of configurations as the JC3jr. Other than a super low voltage moving coil (maybe 0.2 or lower) this incredibly flexible device should work with virtually any cartridge you would choose to use.

I removed the Moon 610LP by Simaudio Phono pre from my system and connected the JC3jr to my VPI Prime Signature table with HRX 3-belt option and Analog Drive System. The cartridge is an Ortofon Cadenza Bronze. Experimentation revealed the Single Ended output setting, using 60dB of gain and 125 Ohms of impedance to work best in my system. After about 75 hours over a few weeks of listening and break in I dug into review mode.

I have been enjoying Vanessa Fernandez's Use Me a lot lately. "Cool Cat" is a laid-back tune that evokes a beautiful evening on the beach. Cool breezes setting the mood. Vanessa's incredibly pure voice backed by guitar, drums and bass. The music flows by evoking moonlight reflecting off calm ocean waters. What struck me was the extremely black background. The JC3jr offered up the signal without and hash or background noise. Clearly the stated S/N at 94 dB was in evidence. This is a very quiet unit. Moving on to the title track the driving funk of the band expertly framed Vanessa's soulful voice, within a large soundstage. This was center table at the club level image precision. Snare drum crispness and high-hat shimmer were not only accurate but perfectly positioned relative the singer. I had to run through the entire album in one session.

Over the last few weeks switching out the five times more expensive Moon 610LP for the JC3jr had me listening for performance differences. "I Am The Highway," from Audioslaves' self-titled album (2017 repress), via the Moon delivers bass with great authority via my Vandersteen Treo CT's.









## **Old School**

Respecting HiFi's Past...

#### Going mobile with cassettes.

Retro is cool and guess what, cassettes are back. Case in point, AC/DC just re-released *Back In Black* on cassette for record store day 2018. I'm also noticing that many of the local record stores around Vancouver are now carrying new and used cassettes along with CD's & LP's. For many, cassettes are the next logical step if you want to bring that warm analog sound with you while walking or jogging. The fun part of listening to cassettes is you'll hear the album the way the artist intended. The bonus is you can make your own mixed analog tapes from LP's.

Vintage home cassette decks are fairly easy to find; however the challenge for many is finding a portable player that works well and offers great sound. Sadly in 2018 there are no major manufacturers making brand new high-quality portable cassette players. Going vintage is your best option.

The question I often get from my vintage audio FB friends is, "What's a good portable cassette player?" To help answer that question, here's a rundown of a few of the early Sony Walkman's that I often suggest looking at along with a few compelling reasons to choose a specific model.

The most famous and arguably the most relevant is the 1979 Sony TPS-L2. During the 70's battery powered cassette recorders were fairly common but weren't designed for walk around portable use and didn't offer stereo playback. We own a Sony Bravo because the TPS-L2 kick-started the entire portable music trend. This first Sony Walkman changed the game because with stereo sound and lightweight headphones it brought high-quality portable stereo sound to the masses.

The TPS-L2 paired with a newer set of high-quality headphones offers an enticing analog listening experience. It offers a relatively modern feature set as well; this first generation Walkman sports dual headphone jacks, independent sliding volume controls, and a Hi / Low tone switch. There's also a cool orange "Hot Line" switch. Pressing this button drops the music volume and engages the built-in microphone, so you don't have to take your headphones off when ordering your favorite beverage at Starbucks.

The main challenge with the TPS-L2 is it's somewhat susceptible to movement. Shaking and rolling while walking or running can cause tiny speed variations, better

known as "wow and flutter". This happens because the capstan is belt driven and tends to pick up the momentum of the unit twisting when walking or jogging. Holding the unit in your hand helps but doesn't completely eliminate the effect. Sony solved this issue with "Direct Drive" technology Walkmans. Their features are up next.

After the incredible success of the Sony TPS-L2, Sony wanted to reduce weight, shrink the size by 25% and eliminate the wow and flutter issue. Sony's solution was a "DD" or Direct Drive design, removing the belt from the motor to the capstan and replacing it with a rubber tire seated directly on the capstan, driven by a sideways mounted motor. This transport is much less susceptible to tiny speed variations while walking or jogging.

Features wise, the first DD units offered two headphone jacks, top mounted volume control and a regular/chrome switch. Later units added Dolby B and a bass boost switch. The final hurrah was the black "pro version" WM-DC2 including Dolby C, quartz lock motor, amorphous super long life heads and a line out jack but sans the bass boost switch.

For sports minded music enthusiasts there was a yellow splash proof Sports DD version which is the only DD unit featuring a built in FM tuner.

For best sound playback I usually record with Dolby B on and playback with Dolby B off. I don't suggest recording in Dolby C unless your unit supports it, and even then levels have to be exactly right or you'll hear a breathing sound during playback.

Choosing the right vintage Walkman DD unit is all about deciding what features matter most. I find them all to sound very similar. If you like serious bass then I'd search for

units with the bass boost switch aka "Mega Bass". Your choice of headphone is probably the most critical part of getting the sound you like best.





## **Old School**

Respecting Audio's Past!

To help sort things out I've summarized the feature sets in the table below. One last thought, if you're planning on buying any of the above mentioned vintage Walkmans it's best to look for one that's been serviced. The original TPS-L2 has belts and they'll likely need to be replaced. With Sony DD units there's an issue with the center gear. It's a plastic over metal design and often the plastic shrinks and cracks leaving a gap in the gear which gives you an audible click click sound. Ideally you'll want to look for a DD unit that has had the center gear repaired or replaced. If you're a DIY kind of person there are replacement gears available on Ebay along with Youtube videos demonstrating how to change or repair the center gear.

Last but not least, don't forget that cleaning your heads with tape head cleaner every 10 hours keeps the highs sounding crisp. I've noticed older cassette tapes tend to clog heads fairly quickly. A tape head demagnetizer is also worth considering. I generally demagnetize the heads every 50 hours or so. Happy hunting and don't forget to bring along an extra set of AA batteries. Nothing worse than running out of power while rockin' out to your favorite tunes.

Now that VPI is in its second generation, Mat Weisfeld has taken VPI to new heights. Opening up to a younger generation than that of the previous VPI owners, he's designed a number of tables more in the reach of new analog enthusiasts.

The Cliffwood, named after the city that made VPI famous, (or maybe the other way around) is a high value table that incorporates a solid tonearm and motor/ platter/bearing combination.

Leaning heavily on economies of scale and a highly talented work force, VPI is able to sacrifice a bit of margin and bring a fully realized design with cartridge (produced for VPI by Grado Labs) that will only set you back \$900.

It comes out of the box ready to roll. All that you need to do is double check stylus force. Ours was right on the money.

Everything but a dust cover is included and it's a wonderful thing that the Cliffwood does NOT have a wall wart power supply, making it that much easier to integrate into your system.

A tonearm cable is supplied, and like VPI tables past, they use an interconnect style connection, rather than a DIN plug.

Should the upgrade bug hit (and it will) there are a number of great cables at your disposal. Just tell whoever you are purchasing a cable from, that you are using it for tonearm duty







Some audiophile grade racks easily surpass the cost of a decent system. I found a solution with Timber Nation's Chris Futrick.

TN produces hand built solutions in standard configurations, or can build to spec, fitting your gear perfectly. Made from top quality, sustainable woods, finishes range from maple to tiger wood. Of course, the more exotic woods cost more, but two-shelf maple racks start at as little as \$600.

Racks ship flat in 2 boxes, one for the shelves a nd another for the posts. Assembly is quick and painless, taking about 30 minutes from start to finish and requiring only a philips head screw driver and a bit of muscle. Timber Nation suggests 2 people for easier set up. I did it myself, shhh...don't tell.

Leica cameras probably enjoy a bigger cult of personality than anything in high end audio.

The images they capture are breathtaking, due in major part to the fanatical level of care that exists in every aspect of their manufacture. While you might argue (probably unsuccessfully) with any Leica owner as to their validity, there is no question that there are no lenses built better than what Leica brings to the table.

Part of that Leica mystique, if you will, comes from high, maximum aperture performance. If Bigfoot is lurking or aliens are creeping in by the light of a single candle, the only camera you'll catch it with is a Leica Noctilux lens. And thanks to the super quiet shutter of a Leica, you'll handily escape without the monsters detecting you.

While so much excitement usually surrounds the 50mm f.95, the super slim depth of field it offers wide open, makes pictures somewhat of a game. The 75mm offers a near similar effect, while allowing you to take a step back. For those that can afford it and use it to its full potential, this should prove the ultimate portrait lens.







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 ${f T}$  he other morning I woke up realizing that I had listened to an entire album, in sequence, in my sleep. The best part of this is that it wasn't a dream about sitting and listening to a record. This record was the "soundtrack" from my dream. Like any obsessed music lover, I went straight to my collection and grabbed that LP, Ray Charles' Modern Sounds in Country and Western *Music*, and I haven't been able to get it out of my head since. No surprise with such great hits like "Bye Bye Love," "You Don't Know Me," "Just a Little Lovin'," "Careless Love," "Hey Good Lookin" and so many others, that this record is on repeat. If this is any indication that my Dream Music Supervisor is looking for acknowledgement, well then, good work! This record is pure GOLD and somebody might want to look at this collection of songs for a musical.

Speaking of sequence, I am very old school when it comes to how a record is structured in its track order. A stunning example, and a record I simply cannot stop listening to since it came out in 1995 is Emmylou Harris' Wrecking Ball. Produced and indelibly stamped by the very talented Daniel Lanois, Wrecking Ball is a start to finish journey both in its storytelling and sonic tapestry with songs written by Neil Young, Rodney Crowell, Lucinda Williams, Steve Earle, Jimi Hendrix, Bob Dylan, Kate, and Anna McGarrigle, Julie Miller, David Olney, Gillian Welch, and of course, Emmylou. Each song unfolds like a ballet, a perfect nod and a bow into the next, so seamless that you sometimes don't feel the emotional punch in the gut stunning you later as you catch yourself humming the tunes, recalling their impact. Nuclear fairy dust is how Emmylou delivers it. Bad news delivered by an angel. It's almost too sad to listen to but I can't stop myself from reaching for it just about every day.

Perhaps it's because I was just back in Muscle Shoals, Alabama making a new record at the legendary FAME Studio, but I have been wearing out my copy of *The Fame Singles Box*. This cool set of 45rpm singles comes complete with a letter from the desk of "Florence Sheffield - Press a nd Promotions" dated June 28, 1968. The letter references their biggest stars to date, Aretha Franklin, Wilson Pickett, Otis Redding, Joe Simon and Clarence Carter to name a few.

It then goes on to list the newer artists in this collection: Jimmy Ray Hunter and The Del Rays, Jimmy Hughes, James Barnett and Art Freeman. The Classic Muscle Shoals Sound right here in the format it was intended to be heard. "The Girl That Radiates That Charm" was also recorded by the great Arthur Alexander as well and is worth the price of the box itself. Jimmy Hughes' "You Might as Well Forget Him" was written by Tommy Roe and was made popular by The Tams.

Paul Thorn is a serious force of nature. His live shows are like tent revivals where sin and temptation are baited and goaded to enter at their own risk. That smile. That voice. His guitar chops and his unbelievable band always make Paul a sure thing when it comes to purchasing a concert ticket. I never miss a show when he's in town. His new record *Don't Let the Devil Ride*, is a groove-fest in the highest order. Everything about this record is stellar and if you don't run out and buy it right now you're just



plain bonkers or suffering from oppositional defiant disorder. Either way, stop depriving yourself and get on this train, it's going somewhere very cool..

So cool that it lead me straight to **Allen Toussaint's** 1975 masterpiece, *Southern Nights*. Straight from the top with "Last Train," this record pays dividends. I don't need to write too much about this one; you just need to hear it and you won't be able to get it out of your head! Peace.

Aural Report by Jeff Dorgay

Car guys love to banter about tires, brake pads, suspension components, you name it. There's a zillion ways you can trick out your car if that's your game, and while we can get somewhat opinionated at times, it's all in the name of good fun. And chances are that even if some of those in your circle don't approve of your choices, if you provide the beer, there's a good chance they'll come over on Saturday and help you install a set of coilovers.

Not so in the hifi world. It's always been pretty contentious. Just as people still haven't learned to watch out for motorcycles on the highway, audiophiles love to argue about cable.

In a love/hate way, of course.

I don't even need to put gas on this flame to start a war. Nothing, I repeat, nothing polarizes audio enthusiasts like cable. (Well maybe room treatments can twist some undies...)

For the record, I do think premium cable does make a difference. I think good quality wire combined with connectors that make a solid connection, that are well executed will reveal more music than off the shelf stuff.

What's the best cable? For me, it's the cable that does the least bit of harm to the signal from the components you've spent your hard earned money on. Who's cable is the best? Heck if I know. I've used quite a few things over the years and I've settled on Cardas, Tellurium-Q, Nordost, and WireWorld.

And it's not a coincidence that these are the only cable companies I've offered ad space in our pages. I know all of these people personally, know what they do, and appreciate their consistently. But then, I'm not an audio enthusiast that likes to geek out that much.

I have four systems that all exhibit a certain level of performance to evaluate components at varying price and performance points. Because every component in your system has different properties, some will interact with cables more than others, and I've seen the most variation in speaker cables and oddly enough, tonearm cables.

This isn't going to be a long discussion on various cable. There isn't a Nomex suit in the world able to hold back the fiery rage that will follow, and honestly, you've got better things to do with your life than argue with me or anyone else about cables. It will just lead to madness, trust me.

So here's my short list of suggestions, take them for

what they are worth. First, don't spend crazy money on cable until you've optimized everything else you can. Don't overlook obvious stuff like leveling your turntable, and making sure your speakers are in phase. Don't laugh.

Find a good dealer that will not only give you a little bit of help and guidance, demand to bring said cable home for a few days to audition in your system. For all the talk of long cable break in, 24 hours of passing signal through will get you in the ball park. If you don't hear major improvement don't write the check. It's that simple. If you're straining to hear a difference, don't write

the check. No matter what all the people on whatever forum you visit say.

Finally, if you can, try and get away from using cable as a tone control and a fix all for your system's foibles.

Crazy as it seems, consider listening for the cable that reveals the most music to you, without altering the tonal balance one way or another. That's my approach, and I'm sticking to it. The right cables can take your system the last click to nirvana if chosen with care. You've all got brains in your heads and shoes on your feet, so I'll leave it to you as to how much of your hard earned cash to spend, regardless of who's cable you choose.

Call up a friend, have them come over and listen. It might be more fun than you think.

always joke with my more religious friends, "if you could ask God one question what would it be? They always come up with fairly altruistic or esoteric questions like "who really killed Kennedy," or "how much time do we have left?" That kind of stuff.

Me, I'd ask the simple question, "Beatles or Stones?" But I'm a simple man, and that would answer the question forever. I like that kind of resolve.

I once asked that question to the late rock photographer, Jim Marshall and he said, "Fuck that, Allman Brothers, that's the world's best rock & roll band." Having been the guy that shot the cover of the famous *Allman Brothers Live at The Fillmore* cover, he might have been just a little bit biased.

A similar bias seems to invade Stones fans, if asked to choose between their earlier catalog and later work. The box we have here does include the widely acknowleded *Exile on Main Street*, along with all of the records that occurred after it.

Me, I'm more of a Beatles guy, but I don't have a hard time admitting that Keith Richards is one of the worlds greatest musical geniuses (as well as a longevity in the face of adversity expert), so I'm equally fond of the whole catalog, and I don't mind saying I love Bridges to Babylon. And I don't mind saying A Bigger Bang sucks. Flame suit on.

Rather than do an exhaustive comparison with Exile (and if you're a mega fan, you probably have ten copies anyway) suffice to say the sonics are very good. The entire set was half speed mastered at Abbey Road, and is in keeping with the other pressings we've heard that have come from this famous house.





## Take Your Whisky Home!

he man with the whisky bottle kept filling my glass. I was thrilled; a 14 year-old drinking alcohol for the first time. It was a synagogue party and I had discovered the joy of sponge cake and scotch. Ultimately, this was not a good combination, as I staggered home drunk—or as we called it in Glasgow, legless. This was my first hangover and it turned me off scotch for about 9 years.

In 1971 I moved to Israel, where a Scottish friend reintroduced me to the stuff—this time a single malt whisky. (This friend, I subsequently found out, used to be a Mossad agent. But that's beside the point). It was a bottle of 18-year-old Glenfarclas, cask strength, and it was delicious. Thus started my journey into the wonderful world of single malts. After that whenever I travelled to Scotland, to the chagrin of my wife, I visited a different distillery. This story is just one small part of my lifelong exploration of uisge beatha, the water of life.

Most Scotch whisky is foul tasting. Right off the still it is disgusting, and after a few years in the barrel it is usually horrible and only worthy of blending. A man called Andrew Usher and his brother John are credited with making blended whisky palatable. Their blend was a mixture of malt whiskies from Glenlivit and Royal Brackla, plus some other non-descript malt and about two thirds grain whisky. They were not the first to make blended whisky, but they were the most successful. Making this rotgut drinkable put scotch on the world map.

Whisky is basically made from distilled beer. You malt (germinate) some barley, chop it up, add hot water and yeast, and let it ferment for a while. Take that "beer", run it through the still, and voila, you have...? It's not whisky. It's really moonshine. Stick it in various types of used oak barrels, and pray it tastes good at the end.

To tell the truth, it's not really as haphazard as that. Now that a few large companies make it they have found a way of standardizing their product. For instance, after germination, when the enzymes and sugars are released, heat is applied to stop this process. In the old days burning peat, which was the cheapest available heat source in Scotland, did this. When peat burns, a lot of smoke is created and this smoke would often penetrate the barley and affect the flavor. Thus each batch was slightly different from the previous one. This artisanal effect made trying newer bottlings most interesting (similar to comparing vintages in French wine). Most of the distilleries in Islay in those days did their own malting but now they have the Port Ellen Maltings, a one-stop shop for seven of the eight distilleries on the island. The individual distilleries instruct the factory how many phenols they want. This ensures a consistent amount of 'smokiness' to the barley and thus a consistent taste. This tinkers with the "terroir" and, even though the whiskies still tend to be good, I feel something is lost in this standardization.

Malt whisky was the only whisky made before the invention of the patent still. Somehow, through luck and later, skill, some of the distillers started making and bottling single malt whisky that was drinkable. And that's the best part of this tale.

The best way to experience scotch is to go to Islay yourself—go to Laphraoig, Lagavulin, and Ardbeg. The flight from Glasgow is short, and the plane is filled with locals. This is a small island, and these three distilleries are about a mile apart from each other. They all use similar barley and water, the climate is the same, and their whiskey barrel warehouses are all buffeted by the Atlantic Ocean; yet, their whiskies taste totally different.

When I've visited, the only immediate difference I could discern was the shape of the stills. I learnt later that most distilleries are superstitious about the shape of their individual stills and when they have to replace them, they re-create them exactly: bashes, dents and all.

I like the whiskies that Laphroig makes. Their 10 year-old is the most popular but I find it rather raw and unfinished. (Although its ubiquity makes it perfectly acceptable in an emergency.) On the other hand, the 15 and 18 years are superb. But my all time favorite whisky is Lagavulin 16 year-old. It has intensity and a complexity that is rivaled only by fine cognacs and armagnacs. It is so peaty, salty and sea weedy that it is not for everyone, especially novices. But, once you arrive there, hopefully after a lifetime of tasting, you will understand what I mean. Ardbeg make very peaty whiskies. The one that I liked the best, 'The Beast" is now no longer available but some of the others are very popular but not to my taste.

I visited the island in 2012 and the French company Remy-Cointreau had just purchased Bruichladdich. I noticed that they had casks from Chateau d'Yguem and also some used burgundy barrels not the standard bourbon or sherry barrels. The investment in making malt whisky is enormous. You have to wait years before the product is drinkable. This can be 8 or 10, 12 or even 15 years; in fact, you can't even call it whisky before it is 3 years old. So there is an enormous push among distillers to produce what they call "New Style Whisky," or, young whisky that is made drinkable. Bruichladdich have a bunch of them and they do this by putting the distillate in non-traditional barrels and hoping the flavors of the casks soften the harshness of the raw spirit. As somewhat of a traditionalist, I so far have not tasted any that I like.

Bowmore is also in Islay, and its distillery is cool. It sits in the center of the town of Bowmore and abuts the banks of Loch Indaal. It is over 200 years old and is the oldest on the island. The owners built a leisure center and swimming pool adjacent to the distillery, and gave it to the local municipality for free. The waste heat from the still warms the waters of the pool. Very ecological! Their whiskies are tasty but again, I feel the younger ones are unfinished and have a slight afterburn. I would start at the 15 year old and work upwards.


When I think back to that drunken day in 1961 I realize that I have been a lover of whisky for almost 50 years.

This romance started in earnest when I brought a bottle of malt whisky to my very first hi-fi show. It was an 18-year-old Macallan. In those days (over 30 years ago) it was affordable and rather unknown. (Now a bottle costs in excess of \$200, which in my opinion is overpriced by \$100.) This started a trend and to every show I have attended I bring a bottle or two. I now judge the efficacy of a show in which I exhibit by the amount of bottles we serve. A good show is 8 bottles and an even better one is 10.

This generosity has caused some problems over the years.

One morning, Sam Tellig of *Stereophile* Magazine fame visited my booth where he drank more than one shot of whisky. He then went to lunch and shared a bottle of wine with his host. That afternoon he attended a "ask the writers seminar" and being drunk, made a real fool of himself. That evening a memo was sent out to all the staff at Stereophile. "No writer is allowed to visit Roy Hall's booth before 5 in the evening,"

Every few years I return to Scotland and stay with my old friend Ivor of Linn Products. More than once we have sat down with a good bottle of malt and reminisced. It's a funny thing, but in sharing these special moments, even though the bottle is usually empty, neither of us is ever drunk.



Vinyl lovers often bump into the MM vs MC question, and there's not always a "right" answer. Often, the toughest part hinges on your hardware. If you don't have a phono stage with enough gain, requiring an upgrade, the choice becomes blurrier, especially if you have a MM phonostage you're happy with.

The arguments on both sides are valid. A MM cartridge doesn't need the extra gain, and often has a bit more dynamic punch than a comparably priced MC, yet the latter often possesses more low level detail retrieval.

The line gets even blurrier as the price tag increases.

We've found the Clearaudio Charisma to be a stunner, regardless of which side of the MM/MC debater you're on. Combining what Clearaudio has learned making cartridges like the Goldfinger, they've come up with a MM having plenty of low level detail, yet not at a loss for dynamic swing either. It's certainly one of our favorites.
