# **Sota Sapphire** Turntable


Still sparkles after 40 years.

\$1,000 - \$2,000 (depending on shape and configuration)

In this wacky world of six-figure turntables and five-figure cartridges, it's heartwarming to see how much analog pleasure can be had out of a classic table. With so many things to choose from, my favorites are the Technics SP-10mk.II, an early 80s Linn Sondek, the Rega P9, and the SOTA Sapphire you see here. Sitting on the shelf at Echo Audio in Portland, Oregon, this beauty had a \$1,500 price tag, including a Sumiko tonearm and an early Benz LP MC cartridge. No way I was passing that up!

This is particularly fun, as we have a new SOTA Nova in for review, and the thought of comparing a current production SOTA to one of the early models seemed appropriate and enlightening. Plus, it makes it so easy to have the older table on hand to compare directly.

Back in the early 80s, when my system was sporting an Oracle Delphi mk.II, SOTA had hit the market as the first legitimate audiophile turntable made in the US. Soon after, VPI would hit the scene, and those craving a US-made table had another choice.



Today's SOTA tables are made in Wisconsin (go Bucky), so there's some built-in love from this cheesehead right away. However, in the beginning, they were built in Oakland, California. Incidentally, the University of Wisconsin – Madison, where I went to school for a while, was nicknamed "the Berkely of the Midwest." So, in a quirky way, it all makes sense. A note from SOTA reveals this table was made in 1984 in Oakland, California.

### A quick spin

Placing a clean copy of Elton John's Honky Chateau brings back great memories. With a current Linn Sondek nearby and a REGAs P9, I instantly remember what made SOTAs such great tables and such a great value back then. Where the LP-12 and the Oracle truly need an expert to set up correctly, SOTAs were always much easier, and once set up, they stayed set up.

Moving on to a broader range of program material, this table does not disappoint. Thanks to its trademark four-point suspension, this vintage analog rig is way more resistant to vibration than my current Technics SL-1200G, Rega P9, and the new Luxman PD-191. If you've got speakers that go down low, you will really appreciate the lack of acoustic feedback the SOTA lets through.



Playing bass-heavy prog tracks from Yes, Genesis, and ELP along with electronica tracks from Massive Attack, NEU!, and Kruder & Dorfmeister all deliver the same result. This table delivers solid bass response, allowing fairly high levels of volume to be achieved. Again, this is a 40-year-old used turntable!



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rinally, this table does an excellent job at inner detail retrieval; even with the supplied Sumiko arm set up to perfection with the Analog Majik suite of tools, it still amazes me how a fully optimized but simple setup can deliver the goods.

Comparing it to the Rega, the SOTA feels a little fatter, playing acoustic pieces with a bit more body. Playing the same tracks on the Linn, the SOTA feels slightly less bloated in the mid-bass. All are fun and offer plenty of musical enjoyment, but this table is so good I ended up keeping it as an example of what can be accomplished on a tight budget.

### Running in the family

While SOTA offers a two-year warranty, the best part of any SOTA table is the ability to be serviced, and all can be updated to current specs. To my knowledge, only the LP-12 has this level of updatability. (if that's genuinely a word). Much like Linn, SOTA has not changed the basic look of their tables, so no matter what vintage you have, they still look great.

The current tables have a few more wood choices but I still enjoy the original, and wouldn't change a thing. Worth noting, the black anodizing has stood up very well for 40 years of use.

Even with the slightly warm Benz cartridge, the overall sound quality is resolving, tuneful, and involving. Nothing you can buy new for \$1,500 will touch this setup. If you so desire, SOTA will update it to a current model and give it a complete tune-up. If I didn't review hi-fi gear for a living, I could live happily ever after with this table, arm, and cartridge. I'd probably replace the Benz with a newer model at some point, but this is analog synergy at its finest. Sometime in 2024, we'll probably send this one back to SOTA for an update to Sapphire VII status, and report back.

If you're intrigued by this experience, please check out the review of the current Nova in our next issue. For about \$5,500 without an arm and vacuum platter, it's another fantastic deal.

### **Hana** Umami Red and Umami Blue

Which one to choose?

\$3,950 and \$2,500 musical surroundings.com

bout 12 years ago when I got my hands on a Clearaudio Goldfinger (from Musical Surroundings Garth Leerer) I felt I finally made it to the top of the mountain. It was the first time I had ever mounted and set up a fifteen thousand dollar cartridge. I was sweating like a heart surgeon through the whole process, but once it was optimized for my AVID Acutus Reference table, the sound was heavenly. I've had a number of primo phono cartridges pass through over the years, but the Goldfinger is still my favorite cartridge of all time.

Why am I telling you this in the context of the Hana Blue and Red review? Because on one level I couldn't live with the Goldfinger. It was like dating a supermodel, and I just didn't have the self esteem to pull it off. It was so good, I was always afraid it was going to break up with me, or break, in no uncertain terms. I wouldn't let anyone near my turntable out of sheer panic. "Get away from my turntable!" came out of my mouth too often. So after a few years I passed it on to a friend.


Another reason for me not keeping a five-figure phono cartridge around as a reference is the level of turntables I own and my record collection. I don't have a \$350,000 turntable, or a gaggle of first pressing British this and that. I have pretty good records. A ton of MoFis, a fair amount of the Music Matters Jazz pressings, some ORGs and such. However, up until recently the gap between the five figure cartridges and the \$2,500 - \$5,000 carts was a wide one. Is a Goldfinger worth the money? If you want that experience, that's what it costs. Is a Ferrari worth that much more than a Porsche? Same thing.



### The gap has closed

Whether it's ongoing R&D, or just more interest in vinyl these days, the cartridges in the \$2,500 - \$5000 range has closed in dramatically on the cost no object cartridges. Hey, in the late 70s a Porsche 911 Turbo was 256 horsepower, and it was a supercar. Today a base, 4-cylinder turbo Boxster pumps out 300, and everyone says it's not enough.

Whenever we've had the opportunity to compare the mega cartridges to the almost mega cartridges, the biggest delta always makes itself more known on a highly resolving system and the perfect records. After a fair amount of time with both cartridges on a few different turntables (SME 20 w/SME iV.Vi arm, the new Luxman PD-191, and the Linn LP-12) I've come away thrilled about the level of performance both of these cartridges offer. Each of the test tables did impart their own sonic signature to the presentation, but overall the voice of the Hanas comes through loud and clear.






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### **Decisions**

From looking at the spec sheets, the two cartridges look fairly similar on paper, and both cartridges sport a microline stylus mounted to a boron cantilever. The coils in the Red are wound on a square iron former and use a Samarium Cobalt magnet. The Red has a slightly tighter channel balance spec, and a frequency response extending down to 10Hz, versus 15 Hz for the Blue. The Blue uses a cross-coil former and ALNICO magnet. The Red has a 6-ohm coil impedance, where the blue has 8, corresponding to about a 60-ohm loading and 80 respectively. Make no mistake, both cartridges deliver excellent bass response.

Both cartridges use a Duralumin body with Auricle design to more securely mount the generator. However, the Red incorporates an ebony wood insert into the Duralumin body and the Blue uses POM. The Blue uses a melamine thermosetting process finish (much like what you see on some speakers that seem too smooth to be paint) to finish the body, the Red sports red Urushi lacquer. On a transducer, the most minute details make a difference in the final sound.

### Final tweaks and setup

Both of these cartridges prove easy to set up with the Analog Magik tools and Acoustic Sciences SmartTractor. Suggested tracking force is 2 grams and that proved to be right on the money. I noticed a couple of reviews on the red where another reviewer mentioned that 1.98 grams was perfection, but I must admit I can no longer hear the difference that .02 grams makes in tracking force anymore, nor am I that pedantic. I think you'll be safe with 2 grams. It's worth mentioning that I used the Clearaudio Weight Watcher digital tracking force gauge (now the newest model) for all measurements.

A bigger difference came with loading. Using the Pass XP-27 phonostage (with settings at 50, 100, and 160 ohms) The Red sounds more alive and open at 50 ohms, where the Blue delivers the best performance at 100 ohms. Ditto for the Backert Labs phono. Interestingly, when using the Nagra Classic phono on its MM input with the Quadratic MC step up transformer, the difference in the upper registers was not as marked between the Blue and the Red .

The new CH Precision I1 integrated is in for review, with it's integral phonostage featuring transimpedance/current loading via an ADC, and all EQ done in the digital domain, and oddly this setup delivered the widest difference in performance between the two cartridges.

### Character

Both cartridges are more resolving and have less tonal warmth than Hana's previous top of the line, their ML/MH cartridges – also a top value choice at \$1,200. Much like the Koetsu cartridges I've owned and reviewed, the Hana cartridges manage to maintain the silky midrange characteristics that permeates their overall design. Yet as you go up the range there is more resolution, a larger soundstage, and more dynamic punch. Refinement in every way. I'll stick my neck out and say the overall tonal balance is as near perfection as it gets without spending five figures. Big, broad, open, and natural with the slightest bit of tonal saturation makes these cartridges a sheer joy to play all of your records – not just the finest ones in your collection.

As mentioned earlier, the sheer force and character of the lower registers is indeed impressive. Tracking through favorites from Thomas Dolby, Massive Attack, and even Pink Floyd, the Hanas deliver powerful bass, with speed and detail. An equally refined high end compliments the rest. Whether you are a fan of solo vocalists, acoustic music, or the heaviest rock, these cartridges really reveal what analog is all about. Going back and forth between the Hana Red and my reference dCS Vivaldi ONE (even the APEX model we had in for review while mine is out for upgrade) still shows that analog has that last gasp of "reach out and touch it" that the world's finest digital comes incredibly close to, but....

The Hanas provide a sense of tonal realism on so many levels, making it incredibly easy to dive into the music and forget about everything else. For me, that's a home run. Even though they take about 10-20 hours to be all they can be, you'll notice it from the second you put the tonearm down.

The main difference between the Red and Blue is in the resolving of the finest musical details, and again, the better your system and records, the more you will notice it. If you've ever wet sanded a car before polishing, or a piece of fine furniture, it's like the difference between 1500 grit sandpaper and 3000 grit. Again, if your musical tastes lean more towards heavier rock, hip hop and techno, you might not even hear the diff between the two. Those listening to more classical, stringed acoustic instruments and vocalists will pick up on it immediately. Anything with a piano or violin and you'll hear it easily, Iron Maiden, not so much.

### So, which one should I buy?

The Blue probably delivers 80% of the performance of the Red, but if you have the money and the system, that extra 20% of performance is still good money spent. Considering how little residual value used cartridges command (unless selling to a close friend that knows exactly how many hours are on the clock and how well you've taken care of it) I'd still push you in the direction of the Red, but I'm great at spending your money. However, if you do just pick up the Blue, you won't be unhappy. How's that for sounding like a politician?



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We've purchased both and you'll be seeing a lot more of these in both Chris Harr's system and mine as we use them as references for a lot more analog reviews in the future. I feel that the Hana Blue and Hana Red offer such a high level of sheer performance and refinement, that they are more than worthy of a Product of the Year award, along with our #toneaudioapproved award for the Blue. (the Red was purchased last year) I can't think of another pair of cartridges that we've reviewed in TONE's 20-year history that have offered this much performance per dollar.





### NAD C 3050 Integrated

Homage to the beginning

\$1,399 nadelectronics.com

purchased a used NAD 3020 many years ago in excellent working condition. It cost about \$125, very near its original 1970s price tag. I still own and use it. NAD's specifications suggest a scant 20-watt rating, but in practice, the 3020 puts out significantly more juice with remarkable sound quality for its price and age. NAD sold over a million 3020s – including its improved 3020 iterations over the years – making it one of the best-selling audio components in history.

Five decades later, NAD released its C 3050 integrated amplifier. While NAD does sell a modernized 3020, its form factor changed substantially. In contrast, the 3050 retains the legacy 3030 styling, including a black faceplate and a dark wood veneer draped around the top and sides. The C 3050 also has simplified, retro controls with push-button selectors for inputs and small knobs that control treble, bass, balance, and a choice of A/B speaker outputs. Owners also get a bonus headphone amp with a ¼-inch input on the front panel.



### **Legacy Looks**

Two VU meters on the left corner of the panel add some fun to the visual appearance. When warming up and muted, the VU meters LEDs shine red. When circuits are ready for playback, the meters switch to yellow-green. The bottom-right side of the faceplate sports a horizontal line of LEDs. The first is orange. Then, as volume increases, the subsequent six green LEDs light up individually.

NAD offers a single subwoofer output on the back panel and a pair of RCA connectors for the included moving magnet (MM) phono stage. The C 3050's one-and-only linestage input is a little disappointing since some audio fans like myself appreciate the option of connecting more than one line-level source.

### Modern capability

Under the hood, NAD modernized the 3050 significantly with a built-in DAC and other digital-ready capabilities. Physical connections include RCA/Coax and optical inputs. For those with a TV that supports HDMI Enhanced Audio Return Channel (eARC) functions, the C 3050 has you covered there, too. The C 3050 also includes Bluetooth capability for wireless music transmission. Those seeking WiFi or Ethernet connection options must purchase the upgraded edition) model that includes the BluOS capability plus other cool features like multi-room playback and room correction using an included microphone with NAD's Dirac Live software. All versions come with a remote control.

However, C 3050 versions lack a type B USB input accommodating a streamer like the Roon Nucleus. According to NAD, the BluOS can access a user's music library independently. Our review sample is the NAD 3050 base version, so we cannot offer hands and ears-on perspectives regarding the card's added functionality. But for more information, do check out the C 3050 instruction manual for all the details about NAD's latest integrated amp.

NAD claims their new integrated amp dishes out 100 watts-per-channel, with 135-watt peak power from efficient Class D circuitry. Driving GamuT RS3i stand-mounted speakers (4-ohm, 87dB sensitivity) requires most of the NAD's available power. The sound, however, never seems to distort.





For comparison, Luxman rates their L-590AXii integrated amplifier as 60 watts into four-ohm loads. When listening to the GamuTs through the Luxman, turning the volume beyond the midpoint is a rarity. I expect that getting more robust volume from the NAD should not be a problem when paired with smaller or more efficient speakers.

NAD also added an excellent feature for energy savings. When no signal passes through it for a few minutes, the amp shuts itself off by default.

### Listening

NAD put some serious effort into what matters most – the sound. Cold and out of the box, the C 3050 sounds mighty good, and sonics improved after warm-up and a few days of playback. Highs, lows, and mids shine through with solid balance, and the 3050 maintains a good grip on the speakers. Regardless of genre, the 3050's signature acoustics render favorite recordings well. It never sounds dull, even with lower-quality recordings, but it's not strident, either. NAD did a great job balancing detail retrieval with a touch of warmth, just like their legacy products. The C 3050 provides a stellar example of how far Class D topology has improved and refined over the last several years.

Bass can sound a tad boomy when streaming through Bluetooth, but that challenge diminishes when using a higher-resolution digital or analog signal. If you want more or less treble or bass, no problem. That's an easy fix with the 3050's tone controls.



Soundtage-wise, the NAD does a great job rendering musical elements extending beyond the speaker boundaries. With albums like Pitch Black's *Rude Mechanicals*, musical elements bounce all over the room and generate a very engaging presentation – even through the Bluetooth input.

You can get greater bass authority, plus a more lifelike and detailed presentation through more powerful and more expensive components. However, sitting and listening to the C 3050 for hours while watching the VU meter indicators rock back and forth is gratifying. It's a great piece of gear.

### Summing up

The NAD C 3050 base model costs \$1,399, the 3050 with MDC2 BluOS-D upgrade runs \$1,899, and the LE version will set you back \$1972. The upgraded packages are an excellent choice for those willing to stretch their budget a little, providing extra versatility and future-proofing. While we could not test it, the LE version's room correction tools can substantially improve overall musical portrayal.

Using similar functionality through a Roon Nucleus certainly does. The base model C 3050 is still a marvelous option for those seeking an economical entry point who don't want or need the BluOS module's capability.


Whichever version they choose, prospective owners will enjoy enormous value from the C 3050 package. For the price tag, a buyer gets an amp, preamp, phono stage, headphone amp, and multiple options for digital playback. In the world of hi-fi, any one of those components can cost a lot more than the entire C 3050. Plus, it delivers on the most crucial characteristic – great sound. If you seek a turnkey integrated amplifier system, the NAD C 3050 is an excellent choice for price-performance playback.

### **Additional listening**

Giving the C 3050's MM phono section a spin proves rewarding. This is a great place to start your vinyl journey. Plugging in the Technics SL-1200GR with Ortofon 2M Black delivers a dynamic, quiet and musical vinyl experience. Even with a more budget rig (used vintage Technics table and vintage A-T MM cartridge) this adds to an already well rounded integrated.

Like Rob, I had a C3020 back in the old days and actually, that's how we met. I had asked Kurt Doslu at Echo Audio here in Portland if he knew anyone with a 3020 I could borrow and the rest is history - *Jeff Dorgay* 





# **Coincident**Frankenstein Stereo

Not a Monster at All.

oni Mitchell's lovely voice always lends itself to a great match with SET amplifiers and my Heretic AD612 speakers. Tracking through a copy of *Court and Spark*, a record I've been listening to for a long time starts out great, becoming more sultry with each track as the amplifier warms up from ice cold. By the time the next record (Santana's Abraxas) is up, the big soundfield has become huge and the amplifier gets more control in the low frequencies. By an hour, the tubes are fully warmed up and stable, offering even more tubey goodness.

Coincident's owner, Israel Blume is a clever guy. Instead of selling his Frankenstein Mk.II 300B stereo SET power amplifier with one 300B or other and have everyone argue about his choice, he's put all the quality into the amplifier, letting you choose your favorite pair. If you've never had the pleasure of experiencing one, they manage to create a special kind of audio magic with a pair of efficient speakers that is nearly impossible not to embrace.



Blume has built a company and a reputation on producing components delivering high musical involvement at incredibly affordable prices. I've used several of them over the years and they always deliver excellent results. I'm a big fan of the highly polished casework too. This is a great looking amplifier.


While cliches like "game changer," "giant killer," and the like abound, the reason for the Frankenstein's level of high performance is more practical. Because Coincident has always taken the manufacturer direct route, the 40-80% markup usually taken by dealers and importers is passed on to the customer. Leaving the final output tube choice to the user saves money and lets you decide how far to take things. Think of the Frankenstein stereo as a prepped race car that you merely need to do the fine tuning on to your preference.

### Unboxing and setup

The Frankenstein keeps it simple with a single pair of RCA inputs and an IEC power socket. However in addition to the power switch (tastefully on the back) is a toggle switch to float the ground. When using high sensitivity speakers, a little bit of noise can sneak into the presentation requiring you to float the ground. Having this right at your disposal is a nice touch.

Initial listening begins with the supplied 5AR4 rectifier, a pair of 6SL7 driver tubes and a pair of Electro Harmonix 300B power tubes. But this is only where the fun begins. If you've never used 300B tubes, please pay careful attention to the four pins on the bottom – two are slightly bigger in diameter,

and if you insert them wrong you will do some damage. As they say on social media, "ask me how I know..." It's a mistake you'll only make once.



another cost saving/value adding measure.) If you have kids or pets, place your Frankenstein accordingly. Because this amplifier has no features to speak of, and requires no adjustments for bias, etc., we don't have much to discuss

in this department. Plug it in to your preamplifier, turn

it on, and roll.













































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### The relatively stock sound

As the Frankenstein doesn't come with 300Bs, and so many have their favorite, it's tough to describe the out of the box completely. The EH 300Bs were chosen because of their reasonable price and availability. You should be able to find a pair of these at nearly any tube store.

There's a certain signature sound that 300B based amplifiers exhibit – more extended at both ends of the frequency spectrum, and a little less liquid than 2A3 or 45 based amplifiers. With 98dB/1-watt speakers, I'll take the dynamics offered by the 300B over a few extra molecules of midrange tonal saturation.

While it might seem unorthodox to play Rush through a 300B system, listening to Neil Peart's drum and percussion work through the Frankenstein is simply breathtaking. Where far more expensive 300B amplifiers I've tried fall down with this test, the Coincident amplifier follows every nuance. In addition to a high level of texture served up, and incredibly dynamic attack, this dense music is served up in a way you can hear everything.

No need for more cowbell.

All those Rush tunes just fanned the flame for some King Crimson and Yes, this time listening more for bass extension and speed. Again, the Frankenstein does not disappoint. The rapid-fire delivery from both bands comes through clean and with enough weight, you might not think you are listening to an SET.

Great as musical information at the frequency extremes is delivered, the real allure of this amplifier is the natural tonality and enormous soundstage it can generate. This is why so many audiophiles that lean more towards female vocal music lean towards the SET. Passing the signal through a single tube eliminates many of the electronic artifacts that make your brain think you are listening to a hifi system instead of music. Ditto for acoustic instruments.

Even if you're an SET fan, you'll be taken back at how pure stringed instruments and pianos sound – there's so much texture and decay. It's creepy good. Once the tubes are warm, you'll be hard pressed to escape the gravitational pull of your couch or listening chair beyond changing a record if you're a vinylista. Streaming via the dCS Vivaldi kept me on the couch for hours on end nearly every time I fired up the Frankenstein. And I'm keeping the review sample, so I can't pay it a higher compliment.




### **Tube exploration**

Good as this sounds, there's more. Swapping the three tubes in the front for a vintage rectifier, a pair of RCA 5691 "Reds" (the black plate version) and a pair of Western Electric 300Bs brings performance to an entirely different plateau. If you say I'm crazy for putting \$2,000 worth of tubes in a \$2,500 amplifier, I'd say "guilty as charged." However, the increased performance is well worth it.

The WE's bring more extension, bass grip and an overall smoothness that you don't hear as readily until you switch back for a few minutes. It's like going from swimming in a big pool to swimming in the ocean. Bigger everywhere. And again, underscoring how good the basic circuit is.

Revisiting the same tracks used for initial listening reveals much more front to back depth. When listening to Joni Mitchell sing "Raised on Robbery," her lead vocal is further out front, and her overdubbed backing vocals are further back than before. This improves even further with the NOS 5691s. Adding these tubes serves up more smoothness and a complete lack of grain. Regardless of the tubes you choose, this amplifier is incredibly quiet, adding to the further sense of dynamic drive. Again, stopping by any audio forum with give you some more info on tubes, or drive you crazy. It's up to you, but know this - the Frankenstein responds well to premium tubes.

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### Simply wonderful

This amplifier delivers such a high level of musical realism, you might never want to listen to a solid state amplifier again. You may never want to listen to another amplifier again. The key to success with an 8 or 9-watt per channel amplifier is the right speakers. If you find the right speakers for your Frankenstein, you'll be loving it.

The 300B single ended triode amplifier is a model of simplicity. Simple to the point that almost anyone can make one. Getting one to sound great is another movie and getting one to sound great for a reasonable price, still another level of attention to detail. Frank is in the last category, and considering how involving this amplifier is, I can only imagine how good the Frankenstein monoblocks are with even more power supply and fine tuning. Precious few people can make a great 300B amplifier, at any price.

I'm happy to go on record saying this is one of the finest 300B amplifiers I've had the pleasure of listening to.

The level of high frequency extension and bass grip offered by this amplifier, even with budget 300Bs reveals major attention to power supply design and transformer choices. Going this route still has you sporting a killer 300B amplifier. At this price I highly suggest spending time on the 300B planet, even if you don't stay there. And don't bother looking for a used one - I've rarely ever seen Coincident gear for sale on the secondary market. People tend to keep them.

In closing, I'm happy to present the Frankenstein with our Product of The Year Award in the low powered amplifier category. And as I like to say... JFBO. (Just F\*\*\*ing Buy One) You'll be glad you did.



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# **Totem**Tribe LCR In-Wall Speakers

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When space is at a premium, think in-wall. Much like the word "lifestyle" used to be somewhat unspeakable, and so it was for speakers designed to be installed in your walls.

### Fast forward to now

Today, several of the world's finest speaker companies have applied the knowledge acquired by building floor-standing speakers to create in-wall products. Now, you'll see the same level of sophistication in crossover, driver, and baffle designs brought to the in-wall game. Many of us immersed in the two-channel world don't know how big the custom install game is. It's huge. While a handful of architectural customers don't care how their in-wall system sounds any more than someone proclaiming that a car is merely something to get from A to B, plenty of us with audiophile sensibilities still need more performance. With that, we present the Totem Tribe LCRs.

My current 2.1 AV system already uses Totem Kin Play Tower speakers, and there's no place to put in-wall speakers, so the Tribe LCRs have been incorporated into my garage system. I spend a lot of time there, so having a mega garage system is a major treat. And we're seeing an awful lot of high-end garages - go no further than the Instagram page @dreamgarages. I hope this review will influence some garage owners to pony up for a pair of Totems for their space!

At \$4,000 a pair, these are not inexpensive speakers, and considering there is no big wood cabinet, rest assured these speakers deliver the performance of a pair of Totem's top-range floorstanding speakers, costing even more. The quality of the drivers, crossover networks, and attention to fine detail are the same.





### What's hiding behind the wall

Each of the Tribe LCRs is in a compact, sealed enclosure, only  $25.51 \times 7.09$  inches. (648 x 180mm) And to fit inside your favorite walls of 2x4 construction, only 3.75 inches deep. (95.25mm). To get solid bass out of the dual 4-inch woofers, the LCRs incorporate a pair of 5-inch passive radiators with a 1-inch titanium-infused soft dome tweeter.

A tiny, paintable "virtually bezel-less" bezel of white metal paintable grill covers the enclosure with ease. There is a single pair of 5-way gold-plated binding posts around the back for easy connection to your favorite speaker cable. If using stripped/tinned leads, firm up those connections. You won't want to take it all apart again.

With a 6-ohm nominal impedance and a rated sensitivity of 91dB/1-watt, these speakers will produce plenty of music with everything from an inexpensive starter AV receiver to an audiophile tube amplifier. They are very tube-friendly, so the Tribe LCRs might be an excellent solution for a den, study, or office where you'd like a high-quality, low-footprint system.

### For the commitment adverse

If you're still in the construction phase, Totem has a kit to build space for your LCRs and save time. However, if your walls are up and the thought of cutting holes in the walls scares the heck out of you, I understand. If you or a friend are handy with a table saw, cut a temporary enclosure slightly bigger than the speakers and tack the boxes to your walls with some wide Velcro. A bit of peeled paint from removing the Velcro will be much easier to repair than an "oops" hole in the wall.

Consider how you will be listening to your Tribe LCRs in your room. If you are more couch-bound, if they will be more part of a theater environment or even a stealth two-channel system, you may like the tweeters placed closer to ear level. However, suppose it's more of a party room, or one for less critical listening. In that case, you can get away with mounting the speakers higher, as the Tribe LCRs have great horizontal dispersion. Otherwise, cut the hole so the tweeters are about 48 inches and be done with it. But I suggest experimenting a little, even if you put them up on a bookshelf, to get a feel first.





### ABSOLUTE PRECISION AND UNMATCHED PERFORMANCE



Hand made in Germany by master machinist Julian Lorenzi, the Forte Turbo is AMG's reference-level flagship turntable. The Forte is machined from a solid aluminum billet and incorporates AMG's celebrated oil-damped bearing, decoupled spindle, 24v DC brushless motor, upgraded linear power supply, and reflex clamp.







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The speakers weigh about 15 pounds each.

One final note: these are high-quality speakers; spend the extra money on hooking them up to your source with good speaker cable. You can head out to the internet and argue a month of your life away, or call the folks at Cardas Audio to help you out. I'm using runs of their 101 bulk speaker cable with excellent results. Aside from the sound quality, Cardas wire is nice and flexible if you need to snake things around to reach your amplifier.

#### The sound

As I mentioned earlier, the Tribe LCRs are a considerable step up in dynamics and resolution from my Totem Kin Play speakers (as they should be) and much closer to the overall sound of the \$8,400/ pair Element Fire v.2 speakers. The only thing they lack is serious low bass (the spec lists the low end at about 60Hz, but if you put these in a multi-channel system or even a 2.1 system, you'll either install an in-wall sub or have something floorstanding. Totem makes an excellent architectural sub, should you want to keep it all in the same sonic family; however I used my Totem Solution Sub for the review period. And I'm not ready to cut a hole in the garage wall yet. That commitment thing.

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

#### **BAT** VK-80t **Stereo Power Amplifier**

A substantial update

Listening to Fleetwood Mac's self-titled record from 1975 with the BAT VK-80t powering the YG Acoustics Hailey 3s is incredibly involving. The YGs are so resolving, I truly love the warmth that tubes bring to the mix. It's always a fun part of the audiophile experience to hear small details and nuances so clearly in a recording you've been listening to for decades. The tightly woven harmonies of Stevie Nicks, Lindsey Buckingham and Christine McVie all float between the speakers in a way that seems to happen much easier with tubes and vinyl than any other combination.

After spending a lot of time with BAT's flagship REX power amplifier (\$25,000) and the VK-56SE that I've had for years, the anticipation to see what they could come up with at the \$12,000 price point is high. I must admit, I'm a huge fan of BAT since I reviewed and bought the first piece of their gear about 15 years ago. BAT does an equally fantastic job with circuit design and visual execution - they look as powerful as they sound.




Unlike a few tube amplifier manufacturers striving to build tube amplifiers without "a sound," (a just pursuit, just not my cup of) the sonic signature of a BAT amplifier is unmistakable. Their sheer dynamic power, weight, and expansiveness are like no other. Eyes closed I doubt you would mistake a BAT amplifier for something else.

No doubt part of this comes from their full triode output stage (not just running a pentode tube in triode mode), based on the Russian 6C33 tube. I know I'm being biased here, but I absolutely love the sound of BAT tube power amps. If you're going to deal with tubes, let's have some tube sound, eh? But don't let me sway you with expectation bias – however I suspect you will strongly respond one way or another.

The VK-80t begins the BAT tube power amplifier lineup at \$12,000, delivering 60 watts per channel into 4 or 8 ohms in stereo mode, but can be updated at the factory to be a monoblock amplifier, or ordered that way to start. It is a fully balanced amplifier, with a push pull, triode output stage. There is only a single pair of XLR input jacks on the rear panel, with no provision for RCA inputs.

In addition to four 6C33 output tubes (two per channel) a pair of 6H30s and 6SN7s make up the input/driver stages, along with a pair of 6922s that are under the chassis. I've never seen NOS 6C33s, so that aspect of tube rolling is off the table, however if you can still find some original NOS 6H30s floating around, they will bring one more click of refinement to your VK-80t. Think of the 6SN7 as more of a tone control. There are many variations on this tube, and will all sound different, not necessarily better. The one advantage to some of the vintage 6SN7s is that they will last almost forever. However, the VK-80t is just fine right out of the box.



#### Time for some female vocals

About ten years ago, BAT amplifiers had a bit of a heaviness to them, which drove some away. Current BAT products have eliminated that heaviness, kept the glorious midrange, and now deliver even more extension at the frequency extremes. What's not to love? Relying on the YGs and the Acora Acoustics SRC-1s – both very resolving yet natural speakers, the listening begins with the older VK-56SE and an early performance of Maria Callas performing *Carmen*.

This is such a good test for midrange, because of the delicacy presented by the various vocalists. Good as the VK-56SE is, when switching to the VK-80t, it's as if the room doubles in size. Swapping to the REX blows the walls down, but it's a linear progression. This is one of the most impressive aspects of BAT gear – their components do not have a "point of diminishing returns." They just keep revealing more music. But not everyone can work a REX into their budget/system. If you dig the way BAT presents music, the VK-80t is wonderful, and if you already own a VK-56 or older, there's enough of an increase in performance, you might just want to trade up.

When Callas enters the performance gently, the VK-80t tracks her voice perfectly, reproducing it in a small way when required, but having the required dynamic reserve to capture her most powerful passages without compression. The earlier amplifier does not breath in as concise of a way. At least in the context of my system, the ARC 80S feels some what thin, and my reference PrimaLuna EVO400 not as nuanced. Putting this in perspective, the ARC amp is \$16k and the PrimaLuna only \$5k.

Don't think I'm getting all geeky and audiophile-y on you, I just love opera. I can't even tell you why. Going way to the opposite end of the female vocal channel, the way the VK-80t handles the dissonant extremism of Diamanda Galas's "Let's Not Chat About Despair," makes Tom Waits feel like a Disney character. Her album *You Must Be Certain of the Devil*, is so full of space (and honestly a fair helping of despair) the VK-80t creates a sonic landscape that feels scary like the most frightening haunted house you've ever been in. Stephen King scary. Maybe scarier.



#### Further exploration

Low bass texture and speed is a major attribute of the VK-80t. Forget the myth that tube amps can't deliver low, weighty, defined, powerful bass. Cranking up the BAT loud with Zillatron's "Fuzz Face," delivers the goods. Bootsy Collins' signature growly, funky bass is in full effect here.

After Callas and Galas, everything else in the female vocal genre is cake, but again the delicacy that this amplifier delivers along with the sheer dynamic drive is pure musical satisfaction. Tracking through Richard Thompson's The Old Kit Bag is a similar experience – this album is full of vocal richness, with decay that goes on forever. The way these big triodes reproduce this type of music that is sparse and complex all at the same time is a special experience.

The most fascinating aspect of the BAT power amplifiers though is the way they retain such a dynamic, punchy sound, even though they are triode amplifiers. Many tube amplifiers that give you the option of switching between pentode (or ultralinear) and triode mode, soften up and mellow out a bit in triode mode. Not the VK-80t. This amp rocks no matter what the choice of program material.

While most of my listening was with the reference Pass XS PRE, as we have the matching BAT VK-80 preamplifier in for review, only compounds the richness of the experience. Using the BAT pre with the BAT power amplifier was never too much of a good thing. The BAT components excel at reproducing musical scale - nothing sounds overblown, or compressed in the way that some amplifiers do. Some amplifiers trade mediocrity for dynamics so that nothing sounds terrible, yet nothing sounds glorious, and others are relentless with fine detail so that only the finest recordings deliver a satisfying musical experience. The BAT components strike a perfect balance. The average recordings in your collection will still sound pretty good (yay tubes) but your best recordings will sound glorious.



#### More about tech and construction

A while back, BAT gave their tube power amplifiers a big, curved handle at the back of the amplifier to aid in picking it up, especially nice, considering more of the weight is at the back with the massive power and output transformers. The VK-80t is 48 pounds, so most of you should be able to pick it up and maneuver by yourself. If you're new to the 6C33 tube, they produce a lot of heat compared to a KT88, KT120, or KT150, so be sure your amplifier has plenty of ventilation room. As with any tube power amplifier, the VK-80t needs about 30 minutes to sound its absolute best.

The VK80t is a fully balanced design, not relying on transformers in front of a single ended design, however it does lack the bridged, symmetrical design of the VK-90t and REX. With a total of ten tubes, you will be looking at about \$1,500 when it is time to re-tube, but my experience with BAT has always been that they run their tubes fairly easy, so you won't be looking for a pallet of tubes in a year.

Like all BAT gear, the Vk-80t is available in a silver or black anodized finish. The quality of the anodized finish on their gear is extremely high, and if you look closely at the way the chassis panels line up, you'll observe the care in their assembly. Unlike several manufacturers that cut corners on fasteners, BAT uses all allen head screws that will not round off after one go. Overall, the level of mechanical construction is more on par with the Swiss manufacturers – very impressive.

Long tube life is only part of the story. BAT uses a very sophisticated auto-bias system, so you'll never have to mess with biasing and re-biasing tubes. This also means you won't need perfectly matched output tubes either. Finally, other than the main power supply fuse, the rest of the VK-80t uses a new fuseless protection scheme, so you don't have to worry about your amplifier going down in the middle of a listening session. BAT has done everything possible to take the potential inconveniences out of using tubes. Like all the other BAT products I've owned or reviewed, the VK-80t sounds great out of the box, but over the first 100 or 200 hours it will open up and reveal even more music. Open it up, plug the tubes in and listen. It's so involving, you'll be surprised how fast that goes by.



Persatility in speaker matching that is wider than most other tube amplifiers, is another unique BAT feature. They give you low (3-4 ohm), medium (4-6 ohm), and high (6-8 ohm) output taps. Try the obvious first, but feel free to experiment. The low setting works incredibly well with the MartinLogan ESL9s on hand, where medium was the best for the Fink Team Kim speakers and the high setting for the Peak Consult Sinfonias. You'll know you have it just right when you get the best balance of dynamics, solid bass response, and the most transparent transition from low to mid bass. I'd suggest waiting a few months until the amplifier is fully broken in and you are really familiar with it to get the best results.

In the end, I love this amplifier. I hope that I have given you enough insight into this product to convince you to investigate for yourself without me coming off as a fanboy. However, after 40 years of listening critically, there are certain products that never cease to be exciting to audition. The BAT VK-80t is definitely on that list. Whether you choose this one, the VK-90t, or the REX will depend on your budget, but either will bring years of musical satisfaction.





The only limitations the AMP-23R has is three inputs, and 25 watts per channel of output power. Before you freak out about the price, remember, a couple of other great low-powered integrateds we love from Pass, Luxman, and Nagra cost considerably more.

If you have high sensitivity speakers, you'll be in heaven, especially if you really don't want to mess with tubes, and even those of you with modestly efficient speakers that don't need to raise the roof will still be amazed at the sonic benefits of the Amp-23R. Oh yeah, it has a killer built-in headphone amp too, which some other reviewers claim is worth the price for that alone.

So there you have it. Be prepared to get the credit card out for this one.



# Amplifier/Low power monoblocks: ampsandsound Bryce Monos

We can't think of anyone in the US that is really taking to heart the old tradition of building tube amplifiers the way they used to be made in the glory days of McIntosh, Marantz, and a few others like ampsandsound.

From the quality of the transformers, to the thickness of the chassis, to the point to point wiring underneath, these amplifiers are built by hand, with extreme care and attention to detail. A flick of the switch on the rear panel allows you to switch from KT 88 to KT120 or KT150 output tubes. The Bryce amplifiers run a single output tube in single ended mode.

The result is unlike anything we've heard. You definitely know this is a tube amplifier, yet in addition to the midrange you'd expect from a single ended amplifier, the bass extension is uncanny, and the noise floor feels like a great solid-state amplifier.


If you can live with 12-15 watts per channel, the Bryce Monos should be auditioned at your earliest convenience.
